"Well, I just know that children should not distract or disturb the driver," Raju meekly replied.




Raju sat up and looked around. He was in his house, sitting on his bed. He could not believe that his meeting with the old man and the camel was just a dream. It was all so real.





## Riding in a Bus



- If the vehicle has seatbelts make sure you wear them.
- Never lean or wave out of the window, or throw or hand anything out.
- Do not block the driver's view in the mirror.
- When you get in or out of the car, use the door on the pavement side.
- Only get out when you are sure it is safe.






- Only open doors or windows if it is safe.
- Keep your hands away from the door handles while the car is moving. Lock the door when you sit in the vehicle.
- When you wait for a bus, stand on the pavement well away from the traffic.
- If you are waiting to get on a bus first wait for people to get off the bus then get on.





- Drivers need to concentrate on what they are doing, make sure that you do not distract the driver, no matter what vehicle you are traveling in.
- Always do what the drivers tell you and do not distract them.




- If you are riding a cart make sure you can control your horse or donkey. If the animal is nervous or uncontrollable it is advisable to not use the cart on hi-traffic roads.
- Be aware of pedestrians and other road users when riding a cart.

If you need to cross the road after getting off a bus, wait for it to move away first then cross the road safely



- Make sure that you load the cart safely before taking it on the road.
- Make sure the loaded material does not hurt pedestrians and other road users






## Raju and his Wonderful Dream


